The Fishing Community Promoting Environmental Awareness and Safety around FSO Gagak Rimang



Fauzi and the Sedayu Lawas' Fishermen Association, Brondong District, Lamongan Regency, are committed to preserving the mangrove areas there.

Stretching nearly a hundred hectares along the coastal downstream of the Bengawan Solo River, over 200 thousand mangroves thrive, with 14 thousand as part of ExxonMobil Cepu Limited's (EMCL) Community Development Program in collaboration with the fishermen's association. By preserving these mangrove areas, the fishermen aim for better air, more fish, and a well-maintained beach.

Beyond planting, the fishermen also emphasize safety to their peers, both at home and at sea, including approaching the safety zone of the Floating Storage and Offloading (FSO) Vessel Gagak Rimang. Similar efforts are undertaken by fishermen in Karangagung Village, Kingking Village, and Karangsari Village in Tuban Regency, as well as in Lohgung Village, Brengkok, Labuhan, Brondong, and Paciran Village in Lamongan Regency.

Workers' Dedication in Planting and Nurturing Trees

Banyu Urip Canteen: Creating a Sustainable MSME Ecosystem





Banyu Urip Canteen offers daily meals such as rice and side dishes, various snacks, clothing, and knitted products that workers can purchase as souvenirs. The canteen is managed by the Business Incubation Center (PIB) Bojonegoro, a mentoring facility for MSMEs supported by EMCL. To meet the sales demand at the canteen, PIB involves 22 MSMEs from around Banyu Urip and Kedung Keris Fields.

Since 2016, EMCL has supported 195 MSMEs from 134 villages in Bojonegoro, Blora, and Tuban Regencies. In addition to the canteen, a similar collaboration is carried out with the Agricultural Business Producer Cooperative (KPA), which supplies rice for catering at Banyu Urip Field. At least, KPA has supplied more than 26.5 tons of rice since 2022.







To facilitate buyers, transactions at Banyu Urip Canteen have implemented digital payment channels.

Defying physical limitations, Sulistiyah never let anything hold her back from growth. Now, she's on a mission, doing remarkable things for the well-being of her family and friends – even mastering the art of crafting knitted products.

Knitting wasn't a skill she possessed before. Sulistiyah, 40 years old, was more into sewing. Her profession as a tailor was well-known among neighbors and friends with disabilities.

However, when she joined the knitting program for people with disabilities organized by ExxonMobil Cepu Limited (EMCL) in collaboration with the Sri Sasanti Foundation, Sulistiyah quickly excelled. Among the 30 other participants, she was the quickest to master knitting and create products.

Sulistiyah independently develops her products. Now, she can sell bags, wallets, keychains, bottle covers, and mask connectors. "Mbak Sulis's products are market-ready," said Laras, a program facilitator from the Sri Sasanti Foundation.

Sulis admits that her products are well-received by customers, including school teachers, study group colleagues, and office workers. •
