Did you know the interesting facts about the Floating Storage and Offloading Vessel, FSO Gagak Rimang?

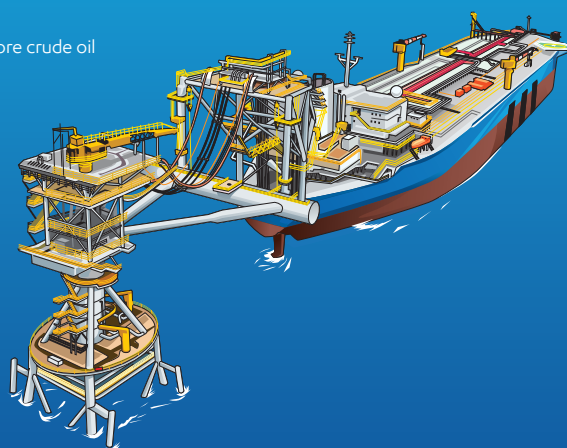
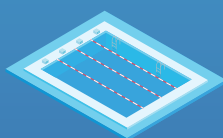
FLOATING STORAGE OFFLOADING/FSO

The Floating Storage Offloading (FSO) vessel, Gagak Rimang, functions to temporarily store crude oil from the Banyu Urip Field before being transported by transport tankers.

Able to accommodate **1.7 million barrels** of oil, or the equivalent capacity of **108 Olympic** standard swimming pools.

For over two decades, Mulyono has stood as the unwavering guardian of a national treasure, the Banyu Urip Field. Now, he is part of the team responsible for safeguarding the 72-kilometer-long oil pipeline.

Age is just a number for Muhamad Ali, who at nearly 53 years old, still has the strength to walk for miles. Every morning, he rises early to start his day by traversing the Banyu Urip and Kedung Keris pipeline routes, navigating through footpaths, rice fields, and even crossing rivers.

During his journey, he often meets residents and reminds them of the importance of safety along the pipeline route. He also ensures that the danger signs are functioning properly.

Ali is not alone. He, along with 24 other security personnel, takes turn walking along the pipeline route from Bojonegoro Regency to Tuban.

As a resident of Leran Village, located close to the Banyu Urip Field, Ali takes immense pride in safeguarding the national economy of one of Indonesia's largest oil producers. •

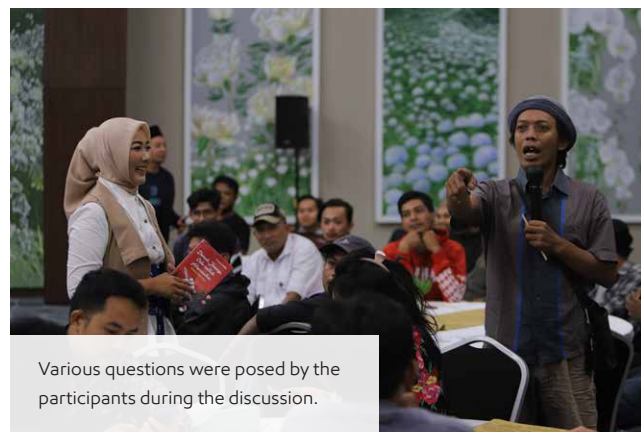
